Rotary Volunteers

Rotary Volunteers, a program of Rotary International, is designed to provide tools for Rotarians who are offering their vocational skills in volunteer service, and Rotary-sponsored humanitarian projects that need volunteer assistance. It is a three-tiered information network that operates at the club, district, and international levels. Rotary Volunteers builds on the traditional Rotary commitment to service, recognizing that many Rotarians would happily give more of their time and expertise to help improve the lives of others.

Rotary Volunteers is centered within the community at the club level. Rotary clubs appoint Rotary Volunteers coordinators who locate organizations, programs, and projects in the community in which volunteers can serve, and help match club members to those needs.

District Vocational Service committees, or RV subcommittees, match volunteers with needs on a district-wide basis, for projects larger or more specialized than one club can handle, or in times of disaster. The district committees also assist clubs in setting up their Rotary Volunteers systems.

At the international level, Rotary Volunteers serves as an information network. Rotary International publishes a list of Rotary club or district projects that need volunteer assistance (the *Rotary Volunteers International Site List*) and a list of volunteers willing to serve abroad (the *Rotary Volunteers International Volunteer List*.) Both of these publications can be viewed on the Rotary Web site at www.rotary.org. Rotarians, Rotaractors, Rotary Foundation alumni, and non-Rotarians are welcome to register as Rotary Volunteers. The registration form can be downloaded from the Web site or you can request that it be mailed or faxed to you from Rotary International.

In short, Rotary Volunteers gives structure to the Rotarian tradition of "Service Above Self." Rotary Volunteers provides a network of volunteerism that extends from local neighborhoods to communities halfway around the globe.
